## Chapter 1 — Love Like Jesus

### Scripture Anchor

"Jesus replied: 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'" Matthew 22:37-39 (NIV)

### Prayer for Guidance

Father, open my eyes and steady my heart. Teach me to receive Your love and to love like Jesus. Give me wisdom that is practical and courage that is costly. Show me what to do today. Amen.

### The Lesson

Two scenes, both burned into me.

**Upper room:** It's the night you'd expect Jesus to demand service. He's the King. The cross is hours away. The team is confused and posturing. Instead, He strips down, takes a towel, pours water, and washes feet — dirty, tired, road-dust feet. No press release. No leverage. Pure love in motion. Then He looks men in the eye and basically says, "Do this." It wasn't a suggestion. It was a pattern.

**My kitchen:** Not decades ago. Not theory. Real life. I came in hot from a long day, carrying stress like it was a trophy. My tone got sharp, my words got sloppy, and I wounded my wife with a sentence that sounded "small" to me and landed heavy on her. The old me would've defended, explained, filibustered — classic New York: talk fast, win the room. The Spirit gave me a different move. I found her in the doorway, eyes tired, and said, "I'm sorry. I was wrong. Will you forgive me?" No legal brief. No "but here's why." Just a clean apology. We hugged in the quiet. Peace came back into the house like air returning to a room.

That was love — costly, practical, immediate. And I learned (again): **love is not a feeling. It's a decision to move in God's direction for someone else's benefit.**

Love isn't soft. Love is steel wrapped in mercy. It's tender heart, strong spine — eyes on God, hands serving people. If you miss love, the entire journey becomes overwhelming pressure. Get love right, and everything else finally has traction.

Most men spend years trying to build a life on a hollow map — careers, image, houses, hot streaks, respect from people who don't even know your middle name. None of that is evil, but none of it can carry the full weight of your life. **Love can.** If you get this chapter right, the rest of the roadmap has traction. If you skip it, the rest turns into a performance that eventually cracks.

## Three Core Principles

### 1. Love Starts Vertical and Shows Up Horizontal

If you try to love people without loving God first, you'll either burn out or keep score. The first commandment fuels the second — **heart, soul, mind** anchored in Him. That's why Jesus could wash feet right before betrayal. He wasn't loving from a leaky tank. He was loving from union with the Father.

Practically: your day runs on whatever fills you first. **Word before world. Presence before pressure.** If you skip the well, you'll draw from fumes and call it "sacrifice." That isn't holy. It's hazardous.

**Upward is where everything begins.** You can't give what you refuse to receive. Many men try to love on an empty heart. They provide, perform, show up — and starve inside. The Gospel doesn't begin with your effort; it starts with His embrace. We love because He first loved us. You can repeat that a thousand times and still live as if it depends on you.

So, start your mornings with five quiet minutes. No performance, no list. Breathe and say, "Father, I receive Your love. I didn't earn it. I can't lose it." Let that truth settle your nervous system. Men who receive well become men who love well.

**Inward love is not vanity — it's stewardship.** You're made in the image of God, which means you handle your life as if it truly matters to Him. Loving your neighbor as yourself implies a healthy way of loving yourself. That doesn't mean indulging every impulse. It means confession without shame, rest without guilt, boundaries without apology, Scripture renewing your mind, and honest conversations before resentment hardens. If you run on fumes, you'll medicate pain or weaponize words. If you live from overflow, you'll carry peace into rooms that haven't felt peace in years.

**Outward love is the daily muscle** — the people right in front of you. In your marriage, it sounds like a gentle tone when you feel justified in being sharp. It looks like blessing your spouse in public and speaking truth in private. It means scheduling a connection and guarding it like a treasure. With your children, love looks like presence — not just rules or provision, but presence. You look them in the eyes. You learn their world. You speak words that plant identity, and when you miss it, you apologize clearly. At work, love builds people, not just projects. You honor in meetings, give credit when others carry the weight, tell the truth when it costs you, refuse gossip, and mentor someone who can't help your career. People notice love because love is rare.

## **2. Tender Heart, Strong Spine**

Love isn't niceness. It's holiness with hands. Jesus could hold babies and flip tables. He forgave prodigals and confronted Pharisees. If your version of love never risks a hard truth, it's not love — it's avoidance. If your version of "truth" never carries gentleness, it's not truth — it's ego in religious clothing.

### **Love tells the truth and stays at the table.**

In a New York apartment or office, this looks like tone discipline and clarity. You can say hard things quietly. You can hold a boundary without heat. You can shut down gossip without grandstanding—strong spine, steady voice.

**Then there's hard love** — where love feels like warfare. Jesus told us to love enemies and pray for those who persecute us. That doesn't erase boundaries. It means releasing people from your private courtroom and trusting God with justice. It means you choose blessing with your mouth while your emotions catch up. It means you speak truth with a clean heart — not with a blade.

Forgiveness isn't amnesia. It's refusing to keep score so you can live free. Boundaries aren't a lack of love. They're how you protect love from chaos.

All of this sounds noble until someone cuts you to the quick. I recall a time when someone close to me misread me and said words that stuck like splinters. I started rehearsing a defense in my mind. In that imaginary courtroom, I always won. The Spirit asked a simple question: *Do you want to be right — or do you want to be free?*

I wrote a letter. Not a legal brief — a confession. I named my tone, my assumptions, the way I had withdrawn. I asked for forgiveness without attaching demands. It didn't fix everything overnight, but it changed me. Pride cracked. Air returned to the room. Hope had space to breathe.

That's what love does. It doesn't always win the moment — it wins the man.

### **3. Boundaries Protect Love — They Don't Compete With It**

Jesus regularly withdrew to pray. He didn't take every meeting. That wasn't unloving. It was alignment. A boundary is a fence that allows fruit to grow. If you're always available to everyone, you're available to no one deeply.

**Tighten your yes so your yes has power.** Love chooses where it can do the most good, not the most noise.

Boundaries also protect you from becoming "nice but resentful." Resentment is love that wasn't honest early. Say the thing clean, set the line, and keep loving inside it.

### **What Love Costs (And Why It's Worth It)**

Love will cost you — time, attention, reputation, control. Unhurried presence can't be rushed. Trust isn't microwaved. Put the phone down and look people in the eyes. Listen until you can summarize their heart. Some will call mercy weakness — wear that opinion like armor. Jesus didn't manage optics. He moved with truth and compassion. Love risks being hurt. That's not a flaw — that's the path your King walked.

Training love is like training a muscle — you grow with reps. Before you enter a room, pause and ask, "Holy Spirit, who needs love here?" Usually, a face rises in your mind — follow that nudge. Then ask, "What form should love take right now?" Encouragement, patience, provision, truth, a quiet shoulder, a prayer in the hallway.

Do the smallest faithful thing — send the text, write the note, make the call, apologize for your tone, do the dishes that aren't yours, put gas in her car, pray with a brother in the parking lot. At night, take two minutes. Where did I love well? Where did I miss it? Confess, give thanks, try again tomorrow.

**Small reps create significant change — that's the compound interest of love.**

### **Three Lies (And the Truth That Replaces Them)**

**Lie #1: If I love like this, I'll become a doormat.** Truth: Jesus loved radically and was never a doormat. He washed feet and flipped tables. He forgave and called people to repent. Love is never the same thing as enabling. It carries grace and truth together.

**Lie #2: I tried love, and nothing changed.** Truth: Love is obedience, not a lever. You don't insert kindness and demand a result. You love because it's who you are in Christ — fruit grows in season. Keep sowing.

**Lie #3: I don't feel like loving today.** Truth: Feelings often follow formation. Act your way into feeling—obedience births alignment. **Consistency beats chemistry.**

### **What Happens to a Man Who Loves Like Jesus**

He gets firmer, not softer. He becomes hard to offend, quick to own his part, and slower to speak words he can't take back. He stops performing for approval and starts living from identity. He walks lighter because bitterness isn't chained to his ankle anymore.

His leadership changes — control breaks, service rises, authority deepens. People feel safe. People grow. Homes heal. Teams unify. God gets the glory.

### **Street-Level Practice Reps**

**Elevator ambush:** A coworker throws shade. Old you fires back or smirks. New you: "Hey, that landed sharp. Can we reset and try that again?" Calm. Direct. Door opens; you both walk out different.

**Kitchen sink moment:** Dishes pile, tensions rise. Old you explains how tired you are. New you rolls up your sleeves, says, "I got this," and asks one caring question while you rinse. Servant leadership isn't glamorous — it's Kingdom.

**Text from the past:** Someone who burned you reaches out. Old you ghosted. New you replies with a boundary and a blessing. You

don't reopen chaos; you refuse to feed contempt. That's love with guardrails.

### **Do-Now Drills (3 actions in 24 Hours)**

**1. Apology — No Defense (Today)** Think of one relationship where your tone or passivity took a toll — home or work. Own **only** your part in a single sentence: "I was wrong when I \_\_\_\_\_. Will you forgive me?" Full stop. No "but." No weather report. Do it **today** before you sleep. If they won't talk, text it (short). **Why this matters:** Nothing resets a house or a team faster than clean humility.

**2. Bless Your House (Tonight)** Before lights out, look each family member in the eyes — even by phone if you're traveling — and speak one **identity sentence** over them. Example: "I love how steady you are under pressure." "You carry joy that changes rooms." "God made you brave and kind." If you live alone, send two texts to brothers you're called to sharpen. **Why this matters:** Love names truth people can stand on tomorrow.

**3. Enemy Prayer (60 Seconds, Out Loud — Next 7 Days)** Pick the hardest person in your world right now — the one who tests your patience. For **one minute**, bless them out loud: "Father, bless \_\_\_\_\_ with wisdom, protection, favor, and freedom. Heal what hurts and lead them to You." No sarcasm. No qualifiers. Set a daily one-minute timer for the next **seven** days. **Why this matters:** Blessing cuts the supply line to bitterness and hands justice back to God.

### **Reflection / Journal Prompts**

- Where have I confused love with people-pleasing, and where do I need to establish a clear boundary, so love remains pure?
- Who under my roof needs to hear specific words of love from me this week, and what exactly will I say?
- What story about my past keeps me withholding love — and what truth from Scripture replaces that story?
- What one daily rhythm will I start to keep love present in my home — and when will I practice it?

## **Practical Notes to Keep You Honest**

**Word before world** means the Bible open **before** your phone. Ten minutes wins. If you blow the morning, steal five minutes at lunch — read one psalm out loud.

**Tone over tactics.** In conflict, drop your volume two notches and slow your pace. It's hard to escalate a man who won't play speed chess.

**Finish clean.** If you promise it, calendar it. Love without follow-through trains people not to trust you.

**No martyr play.** "I'll do everything" is control with a halo. Invite help, delegate clearly, and say thank you.

**Measure the wake.** People won't remember your lines. They'll remember the air you left behind — lighter or heavier.

### **Final Word**

Love is not an accessory to your faith. It's the operating system. It costs time, pride, and a few speeches you'll be tempted to give. Pay the price.

When you love — really love — heaven gets loud in ordinary rooms: kitchens, conference calls, sidewalks.

**Start vertical. Move horizontally. Keep your spine. Keep your gentleness.**

And when you blow it — and you will — apologize fast and get back in the game.

That's how houses heal. That's how men change. That's how we start living like Jesus in a New York minute — right now.
